Introduction from Katie Cornwell, Deputy Head Girl

When I say the Sixth Form is a great place to be, I truly mean that. We're genuinely like a little family (it's so cheesy and I hate to say it but it's the best and most accurate way to put it into words). If you walk into the Sixth Form study area, you will see a giant display that all the Year 13s put together that's full of pictures of every single one of us, and that there truly represents what this Sixth Form is about. The jump from GCSEs to A Levels is the biggest jump and hardest transition students will make nowadays but the Sixth Form community make that transition just that little bit smoother. Someone is always there to listen, whether it be pastorally or academically, someone is always there to provide support.

I originally didn't come to Emmbrook, I went to Farnborough Sixth Form College instead. However, after the first 5 weeks of attending the college, I emailed Mr Constable (our amazing Head of Sixth Form) asking if I was able to come back to Emmbrook. After 10 minutes, an email came through and I was back two days later. Teachers are available to you whenever you need them, whether you drop them a quick email or pop in to see them during one of your free periods. The majority say that one of the best things about being in Sixth Form is the student-teacher relationships. You are effectively adults now and that's exactly how you are treated. Don't get me wrong, if you are stuck and in need of help, your teachers are more than happy to sit down with you and guide you through your work, but there is a new level of independence.

That independence starts with our privilege of having free periods throughout the day. You decide what you do with those free periods. If you decide to stay onsite during your free periods then the Sixth Form offers a study area where there are ample amounts of computers and resources, such as books and magazines that can help you with your studies. There is also a common area that can be used for some down time that is truly well deserved.

This Sixth Form is constantly improving. Every idea is heard and acted upon in the best way possible for the students. If you do pick to come here next year, I can promise you that support will be there every step of the way.



Pastoral Support in Sixth Form

Throughout their time at the Emmbrook Sixth Form each student is assigned to a dedicated tutor who supports them with their learning and wider experiences within the Sixth Form. They spend 25 minutes a day with their tutor, during which time they will undertake a range of activities to help them develop the correct mindset for A level study and to assist them with their progression plans.

VESPA Model

During year 12 our tutorial programme is based around developing knowledge of wider skills and provide our students with the correct tools for success on A levels. The VESPA model is a tried and tested method for assisting A level students with developing the skills needed to be successful and one that we use throughout year 12. It is focused on helping students move from a 'fixed' to a 'growth' mindset and provides them with the tools needed to embrace the challenges at A level and to be successful in their studies.



Progression

Students start to focus on their progression plans early in year 12 as part of the tutorial system. From May half term we officially shift our focus in tutorials to progression planning. All students are enrolled on the UCAS system and the tutors support each student with the writing of their personal statements. We encourage all students to write a 4000 character personal statement, even if they are not applying to UCAS, because it provides a foundation for any progression route. As an institution, we work closely with Wellington College to provide support for all our UCAS applicants, especially those looking at Russell Group universities. There is a dedicated section of the Sixth Form Sharepoint site aimed at supporting students through the progression process, exploring UCAS and a range of alternative progression routes. In addition, all of our tutors are experienced with personal statement writing and we have an excellent track record with supporting our students through their progression paths.

Additional Studies

Throughout their time at the Emmbrook Sixth Form, students have a one hour session every two weeks focused on preparing them for life after Sixth Form. During year 12, this session is focused on exploring a number of areas that students will encounter after school, such as financial awareness. During year 13, this session is a progression workshop; it is a time when all learners have dedicated support from the Sixth Form team to assist them to obtain the progression route they wish to follow post 18.



New Futures

New Futures is an opportunity available to Year 12 students where they raise funds to take a group of students from Addington School in Woodley to the Tyr Abad residential centre in Wales. Throughout the trip, the Sixth Form students assist and help the pupils during activities such as caving, rock climbing, gully scrambling and canoeing. The week-long trip offers a chance for year 12 students to build up trust and bond with the students. They develop existing skills and gain entirely new ones. In the past it has acted as a catalyst for future careers in the care world. The whole experience is exhausting, yet incredibly rewarding.

Social Aspects

Keeping a balance between school work and social life in Sixth Form is made easy through various social events. Key aspects are the frequent social events that occur outside of the school which help integrate the two years together. They also have various Sixth Form events such as fundraising week, which work on a similar level to integrate students. The social areas of the school create a great atmosphere between the two Sixth Form years.

Fundraising Week

The annual fundraising week organised by the Sixth Form leadership team and supported by the fundraising committee, is an integral part of Sixth Form life. It involves the whole school and everyone participates enthusiastically. The week involves a range of events, all organised by the Sixth Form, and traditionally ends with a staff event. This is a fantastic opportunity to raise large amounts of money for the chosen charity, and have fun at the same time. Last year, the school raised over £2000 for their chosen charity. Participating in the fundraising week is a great way to develop team work and communication skills and also gain experience in planning events.

Community Service

As an Emmbrook Sixth Form student, you will complete 20 hours of community service over the course of the school year – roughly an hour a week, whether it be helping teachers in lessons, giving tours to parents or working for charities. This doesn't have to be completed within the school hours or on the school site. These extra-curricular activities enable students to develop a sense of community and are an excellent opportunity for them to be equipped with new, transferable skills. Collectively, this means thousands of hours of help for teachers in school and local voluntary organisations. The hours will be signed off by the form tutor and are a fantastic benefit when it comes to references for university.



Peer Mentoring

Peer mentoring is an excellent opportunity for Sixth Formers to work with students from the lower school who may need that extra bit of support during their studies. All sixth form students are offered this opportunity and are provided with the training and support needed in order to be a successful peer mentor. Peer mentoring takes a variety of forms, you could be paired with a student from year 8 through to year 11, support the homework club, or support a safe space for vulnerable students during break times. Peer mentoring enables you to develop a range of skills which are highly valued at university.

Leadership Opportunities

During year 12, all students will be offered the opportunity to take on a leadership role within the Sixth Form and wider school. There are a number of sixth form committees, such as the fundraising committee and social and wellbeing committee, which you can join. Being part of a committee provides you with the opportunity to help shape the direction in which the Sixth Form moves forward. In year 12, there is also the opportunity to be a House Captain for one of the four houses at the school or to be a school prefect. This allows you the opportunity to have a wider impact on school life by working with staff and the lower school to organise a range of extra-curricular events for the school. In year 13, all students have the opportunity to apply to be part of the student leadership team and potentially take on the role of Head Boy or Head Girl for the school. These are the most senior leadership opportunities available to students and allow you to take on a major role in the running of the school during your final year.

Trips

We pride ourselves on offering a range of extra-curricular opportunities to our students in the Sixth Form. All students are taken to a careers fair during year 12 and to a 'safe drive, stay alive' event aimed at new drivers. In addition, students are offered the opportunity to sign up to a range of trips, such as Tyr Abad and China, which offer them unique opportunities whilst in Sixth Form. We also work closely with Camps International who offer the Sixth Formers the chance to spend four weeks abroad contributing to a range of local and environmental projects, as well as developing a number of skills. The next Camps International trip is to Kenya in 2021.



Post 16 Exam Results 2020

A-levels are not about the exams, they are about the learning and progress made over the duration of the course. We are immensely proud of the way these students went about their studies and conducted themselves as their courses ended in the most unprecedented of circumstances. We are delighted that the students were awarded the grades that their hard work and effort deserved.

One quarter of our students achieved A* and A grade passes, and over 80% secured A*-C grades. This represents an improvement on last year and keeps our Sixth Form performance in-line with all of the high performing local and National Sixth Forms.

Academic achievement is strong across the breadth of the curriculum. The school's strong focus on academic excellence has paid dividends across a broad range of A level subjects. A significant proportion of students achieved the highest grades of A*/A in a wide range of subjects, including: English Literature, Maths, Further Maths, Media and Religious Studies.

As always, our top performing students achieved results that put them amongst the highest achievers in the country. We are extremely proud of our top performing students; Wiktor Kepa scored three A*'s in English Literature, Religious Studies and Theatre Studies. Ellie Harrop scored two A*s English Literature, Religious Studies and an A in History. Ryan Murphy scored an A* in English Literature and two A's in History and Government and Politics. Head boy Mark Crawley scored three A grades in History, Religious Studies and Theatre Studies, Head girl Mhairi Robertson scored three A Grades in Religious Studies History and Sociology, Alex Pang scored three A Grades in Computer science, Mathematics and Physics.




Subject Clusters.


