

A Level Spanish

Grade entry requirements:

GCSE 5 or higher at MFL

Subject Outline and Progression:

The A-level Spanish course is a comprehensive program designed to develop students' proficiency in the Spanish language and provide them with a deeper understanding of the culture, society, and issues of the Spanish-speaking world. Exam details:

Paper 1: Listening, Reading and Writing

Duration: 2 hours 30 minutes; total raw mark: 100; scaling factor x2

Paper 2: Writing

Duration: 2 hours; total raw mark: 80; scaling factor x1

Students will answer an essay question in Spanish for each of the two works they have studied (this can be a book and a film, or two books). Students will have a choice of question on each book/film.

Paper 3: Speaking

Duration: 21–23 minutes (including 5 minutes supervised preparation time); total raw mark: 60; scaling factor x2

The test will be in two parts. Part 1 will be the discussion of one sub-theme from those in this specification, lasting 5–6 minutes, and Part 2 will be the presentation and discussion of the student's individual research project.

- Popular movements (Movimientos populares)

Skills that will be developed:

The course aims to enhance students' speaking, listening, reading, and writing skills in Spanish. It covers complex grammatical structures, vocabulary, and idiomatic expressions. Furthermore, students will enhance their critical thinking skills through their individual research project, allowing them to investigate a topic of their choice related to Spanish-speaking countries. Additionally, they will study prominent literary works and films from Spanish-speaking regions, analysing themes, literary techniques, and historical context.

Works well with:

A-level Spanish can complement a range of other options: it could pair well with subjects like Economics, Geography, History, Philosophy, and Politics. But it would also nicely balance out options such as Physics, Maths and Computer Science.
