


What is Unifrog?

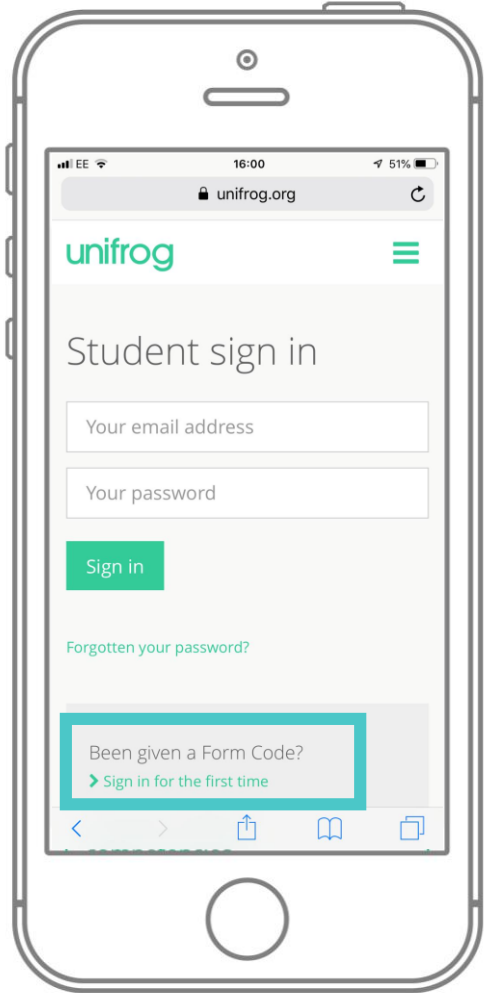
